Celebrating Dr. Corriveau

We would like to recognize Erin Corriveau, MD, MPH. for her commendable work in the field of tuberculosis and who recently won the <u>American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) Public Health award</u>.

Dr. Corriveau is an Associate Professor in the departments of Family Medicine and Community Health as well as in Population Health at the University of Kansas Medical Center. She is a practicing physician and faculty educator as well as an appointed public health official in Wyandotte County, KS. She regularly provides care for persons with tuberculosis and has experience treating children and adults with MDR-TB.



We asked Dr. Corriveau about her TB triumphs and trials. With collaboration woven throughout her message, she shares a little bit about her journey below. Thank you Dr. Corriveau for being such a generous collaborative partner with MCCT. We truly appreciate you and the impact you are making.

What is your most significant success working with TB?

"I'm most proud of the way our health department team treated our patients and families affected by the MDR-TB outbreak in our community. In effect, we wrapped medical and social services around our patients in a community based person-centered manner. I'm also proud of how we continue to apply the ideal of whole-person care within our TB program, so that we meet many needs for our patients when they interact with us. Of course, I'm proud we stopped an outbreak of a dangerous drug-resistant strain of TB in its tracks, but the way we did it was important, and remains our commitment to how we do our work. I remain so grateful for the many mentors I have, given at times I felt thrown into the deep end of a hard situation; people like Dr. Dick Brostrom, Dr. Barbara Seaworth, Dr. Lisa Armitage, among others."

What is your biggest challenge working with TB?

"Care for patients with tuberculosis demands both flexibility and dogged commitment. Sometimes it takes tough love, and it can be tiring. The struggle for resources for our patients can be daunting at times, but I feel thankful that many wonderful people in our county and state health departments also have vision and dedication to the cause at hand. Of course, because I'm a 'newbie', I am ever trying to be a better TB doctor; to keep learning through reading and asking questions. It is challenging to keep up with both the clinical and public health demands that come along with tuberculosis, but I feel very positive about the challenge most of the time! My positivity grows from being part of a great local TB team, such that we support and encourage one another as we offer the best we can for our patients and community."

TB Technical Instructions

The 2024 Technical Instructions for Tuberculosis (TB TIs) for Panel Physicians have been posted on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website and are effective as of January 24, 2024, with major changes to testing to be implemented no later than October 1, 2024. These instructions are specific to the immigration medical evaluation overseas. They should not be used as guidance to test for or treat tuberculosis disease in other settings or as a clinical manual that defines detailed laboratory procedures or specific treatment regimen details.
